







The City of Tallinn is ready to host the International Children's Games on August 3-8, 2025

City Specifications

461,000 people live in Tallinn, a third of Estonia's population. Tallinn's ethnic diversity includes Estonians (52.9%), Russians (35%), Ukrainians (3.8%), and other nationalities (8.3%).

The area covered by the city is 159.3 km², about the same size as Liechtenstein.

Tallinn's number one attraction is the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Old Town, with its medieval ambiance and exceptionally well-preserved street network and city walls. Other popular attractions include the Estonian Maritime Museum, the 314-meter-high TV Tower, Toompea Castle, and Kadriorg Park.





Participants

Tallinn International Children's Games plans to have a minimum of 900 athletes from 70 cities participating in the games in 2025. ICG family is big and growing yearly, but we see the potential to involve more Northern parts of Europe. Our goal is to invite our friendship cities to join the movement and be part of the ICG family.














Kalevi Keskstaadion (athletics)

Kalevi Keskstaadion is a multifunctional sports venue, built in 1955 and renovated in 2022. It regularly hosts world-class athletics competitions. Stadium's capacity is 12,000 people.







Tallinna Spordihall (judo and fencing)

Tallinn sports hall is originally an indoor athletics facility but will transform into a judo and fencing arena during the International Children's Games. Tallinn sports hall underwent a thorough renovation in 2023. The arena has a grandstand for spectators.







Kalevi Spordihall (opening and closing ceremony)

Kalevi sports hall was built in 1962 and renovated in 2017. The arena is mostly used for basketball, but it will host the opening and closing ceremonies of the International Children's Games. The sports hall has 1,700 seats, accommodating nearly 2,000 people with the stands. Kalevi sports hall is also a backup arena for the ICG basketball tournament if the weather does not allow the competition to be held outdoors.







Kalev Spa (swimming)

Kalev Spa has a 50-meter Olympic pool with eight swimming lanes. The swimming arena has a small grandstand which was freshly renovated in 2019.







Sportland and Nike Arena (football)

The International Children's Games football tournament will be played on two artificial turf pitches. Sportland Arena regularly hosts Estonian championship games, while Nike Arena hosts Estonian youth championship games. Sportland Arena has a grandstand with a capacity of 1,200.







Freedom Square (3x3 basketball and beach volleyball)

Freedom Square is in the heart of Tallinn. Three basketball and two beach volleyball courts will be built there during the International Children's Games. A grandstand for spectators will be erected at both the basketball and beach volleyball courts.







Accommodation and Food

Athletes, coaches, and Heads of Delegation will be hosted at least in 3* city center hotels (mostly DBL + extra bed and twin rooms) along with breakfasts and dinners of a sufficient quality and variety. Lunch will be served next to sports venues (Kalevi Keskstaadion, Tallinna Spordihall, Freedom Square, Sportland, and Nike Arena) and in the Kalev Spa hotel. The menu will be of good quality and different variety: main course with salad or vegetables, fruits or desserts.







Arrival and departure transportation

Tallinn will organize a shuttle service between the airport and the hotel for all accredited persons.

Description of Airport

Tallinn Airport or Lennart Meri Tallinn Airport is the largest airport in Estonia. Tallinn Airport is open to both domestic and international flights. It is located 5 km southeast of the center of Tallinn on the eastern shore of Lake Ülemiste – close enough to be considered a city airport as the city center is extremely close to it.





Public transport

Tallinn is very compact and easy to get around. Reaching farther out destinations is simple thanks to the city's network of <u>buses</u>, <u>trolleys</u>, and <u>trams</u>. The public transport network operates from 6:00 to 23:00 daily (see <u>timetables</u> for further information).
